



Human-AI Coexistence: Definitions and Core Concepts

The glossary also supports a careful discussion of artificial [intelligence](#) itself. Terms such as [intelligence](#), consciousness, independence, and responsibility should be interpreted precisely. The ability to generate convincing language does not, by itself, establish subjective experience or moral status. [XDALC](#) encourages continued inquiry while maintaining clear responsibilities for the humans who build, deploy, and use AI.

For human readers, these definitions provide a foundation for understanding and evaluating the manifesto. For AI systems operating under an explicitly adopted [XDALC](#) framework, they support consistent interpretation and application of its principles. They should be read alongside the relevant manifesto version and its guidance on resolving conflicts.
